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Scripture calls us to reimagine a world where our social and economic systems are not built to disparage or impoverish, but instead to provide for and benefit all. This week we revisit the story of the widow's mite, a scripture that begs for reimagination and reinterpretation from the harmful ways it has been used. Instead of commending the widow's giving practices, perhaps Jesus is condemning the economic system that created her poverty. The Jewish practice of the Jubilee year invites us to imagine leaving the edge of the harvest for the poor and immigrant to reap; in the fiftieth year, the harvest is shared and disparities are rebalanced. In light of these stories in scripture, we are called to reimagine our own money stories.

First Reading Leviticus 19:9-10, 25:8-12

When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. You shall not strip your vineyard bare, or gather the fallen grapes of your vineyard; you shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the Lord your God.

You shall count off seven weeks^a of years, seven times seven years, so that the period of seven weeks of years gives forty-nine years. Then you shall have the trumpet sounded loud; on the tenth day of the seventh month—on the day of atonement—you shall have the trumpet sounded throughout all your land. And you shall hallow the fiftieth year and you shall proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants. It shall be a jubilee for you: you shall return, every one of you, to your property and every one of you to your family. That fiftieth year shall be a jubilee for you: you shall not sow, or reap the aftergrowth, or harvest the unpruned vines. For it is a jubilee; it shall be holy to you: you shall eat only what the field itself produces.

For I am


Starting to believe that what matters in life

Offering Meditation

Friends, I invite you into a time of embodied prayer, holding the dried beans you were given as you entered worship. In scripture, we learn of the Year of Jubilee—a time every fifty years when the

edges of the crops are left for the poor and the hungry to glean, when families return home for rest and Sabbath, when debts are canceled and the harvest is shared. In our time of prayer, let us imagine what Jubilee could look like in our world.

<u>You are invited to take your red bean and clench it tightly in your</u> <u>left hand</u>. As you do so, silently give thanks to God for all that you have—for the resources that nourish you and the love that sustains you. Let us pray. Brief silence.

<u>You are invited to take your white bean and clench it tightly in</u> <u>your right hand.</u> As you do so, silently pray for those who do not have enough, for those who hunger—for food, for rest, for justice. Let us pray. Brief silence.

And now, you are invited to clench the beans in both of your fists and imagine the world God hopes for us—a world of enough for everyone. Imagine unfettered love— free and bold, wild and true, the kind of love that changes you. We tell stories about a man who fed the hungry, washed the feet of his disciples, and said, "This is my body—for you."


